M.W. Bro. G.M. Davies, from Manitoba, will be the Guest Speaker at the 76th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Alberta.

Born and educated in Winnipeg he won the Governor-General's medal at St. John's High School and graduated in Arts from St. John's College. He has a master's degree from the University of Manitoba and at the Faculty of Education won the Dr. Fletcher and University gold medals. After teaching high school for seven years he served as secretary of the province's Royal Commission on Education and the School Division Boundaries Commission and is now Associate Deputy Minister of the Department of Continuing Education and Manpower.

A licensed Anglican lay reader, he has an impressive record of service in the parishes of St. John's Cathedral, Good Shepherd and St. John's College Chapel, having been vestryman, synod delegate, organist and choirmaster. During World War II he saw active service with the Canadian Army in Sicily, Italy and Western Europe, returning with the rank of Major. Married in 1947, he and his wife Mildred have two daughters training as teachers, Pam in Edmonton and Judi in Winnipeg.

Initiated in Ionic Lodge No. 25, Winnipeg, in 1941, he was Master in 1961 and D.D.G.M. in 1965 and was appointed the J.R.C. Evans Memorial Lecturer for 1972-73. His family has a long association with Ionic Lodge, his father having been Master in 1937 and the Grand Master installed his brother Ronald as Master in 1974.

THE MASONIC ORDER IN THE NEWS

On February 28, 1981 the Calgary Herald carried a news item from the Canadian Press in Seaforth, Ontario. The story was about two women who were asked to leave a "service club banquet" because it was for men only.

The banquet was "billed as brotherhood night for eight area service clubs, Lions, Oddfellows, Masonic Lodge, Knights of Columbus, Optimists, Legion, Forresters and Orange Lodge.

The ladies were quite upset and said that they plan to write "to the eight service clubs to protest their policy."

Editor's note — While the ladies have a point The Masonic Order should be even more concerned about being classed as an area service club. Letters of protest would not be as effective in this matter as would be a reexamination of basic tenets and principles.

On Saturday, March 7, 1981, in the Religious Section of the Calgary Herald there was a story headlined "Vatican Reaffirms Ban on Masons". The story says that the Vatican's Sacred Congregation on the Doctrine of faith has reaffirmed its 258 year ban against Roman Catholics joining the Masonic Order and stated that those who do, face the severe penalty of excommunication from the church.

This body, which is the church's chief guardian of religious discipline said that it wished to clear up "mistaken and tendentious interpretations" of a 1974 statement it had made about Roman Catholic membership in Masonic Organizations.

The ban on Roman Catholics becoming members of the Masonic Order dates back to an act by Pope Clement XII in 1738. The 1918 Canon Law of the church states "Persons who have themselves enrolled in the Masonic Sect or in other associations of the same kind which plot against the church or the legitimate civil powers incur by this fact excommunication".

The article concludes "Free Masonry, whose formal origins, date from 1717 in Britain describes itself as non-sectarian, non-political and devoted to universal brotherhood but the Roman Catholic Church holds its beliefs and secret rituals are paganistic."

Beginning with Clement XII eight popes have condemned Free Masonry as unacceptable to the Roman Catholic Church.

<u>Editor's note</u> — First the Masonic Order is called a Service Club and next it is described as pagan. It appears that we have been doing rather a poor job in following the hope of the words in the General Charge in showing the world what Free Masonry is all about. Perhaps we haven't made up our minds ourselves.

Acacia Lodge No. 11's altar and pedestals, on loan to Heritage Park for several years, were returned and in place.

It is interesting to note that many artifacts are now coming out of the woodwork. The Grand Master's apron, collar and jewel of Most Worshipful Dr. A.E. Braithwaite, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba in 1903, while a member of Acacia Lodge, has surfaced. As has the Past Master's jewel of M.W.Bro. H.C. Taylor, the second Master of Edmonton Lodge, and Grand Master of Alberta in 1907.

The Ionic Club has agreed to erect the extension to the original building. This portion will contain a museum. It is hoped that the main lodge room will be used extensively by lodges and members. Several bookings have already been made.
