THE GRAND MASTER'S MESSAGE

Brethren, I wish to take this opportunity, in the first Bulletin of our new Masonic year, to express my sincere thanks to all the Brethren of the Jurisdiction for having conferred the Office of Grand Master upon me. I sincerely appreciate the great honour you have bestowed on me in electing me to this high position. My greatest hope is that I will be able to discharge my duties in a manner befitting the confidence you have placed in me.

On looking back I see the names of many great men who have served this fraternity as Grand Master. I do not expect to fill their shoes, but with the support of all my Brethren, I hope to meet my responsibilities fully and add something to the Craft for the benefit of all.

I ask the Worshipful Masters to arrange to have those members who have not attended Lodge for some time, to be personally contacted. I also ask that a visitation be made to those who are in arrears or who are about to be suspended. Forget the mail and make that personal contact for I am sure that it would pay off in gaining greater attendance at our meetings.

It would appear that we are not as dedicated and proud of our fraternity as we should be when one looks at the attendance at our communications at the local, District and Grand Lodge levels. There were 24 Lodges not represented at Grand_Lodge this year. Why does this happen? Are our three principal officers taking their pledge and duty to attend Grand Lodge too lightly?

How can we all do our part to build stronger ties in our family of Lodges?

Let us each make a strong resolution to devote greater effort to being involved and carrying out our duties in this new Masonic year.

Brethren, my theme this year is:

"The Extended Hand of Masonry"

A theme that I feel blends well with all facets of our Craft from the moment of first admission into the Lodge to the time that you were raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason. In closing, I quote one verse of a poem entitled

Most Worshipful Brother William (Bill) Graves was born at Shaunavon, Saskatchewan on July 29th, 1929. He commenced his education at Shaunavon and after moving to Regina, completed it in that city. M.W. Bro. Graves was initiated in Medicine Hat Lodge No. 2 on March 14th, 1967 and became Worshipful Master in 1973. In 1977 he was invested as District Deputy Grand Master of District No. 2. He was elected to the Board of General Purposes in 1978 and served on the Board for two years. He has been the Grand Representative near the Grand Lodge of Alberta for the Grand Lodge of Chile since 1979. He was General Chairman of the Banff Masonic Spring Workshop in 1984. M.W. Bro. Graves is married to Doris and has two children, a daughter and a son. He has had many years of police service and is presently a sergeant with the Medicine Hat Police Force.

THE GRAND LODGE BULLETIN

You will notice a major change in the format of the Grand Lodge Bulletin starting with this volume. THE FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF THE PRINTING OF VOLUME 1 NUMBER 1 OF THE BULLETIN 1935-1985

You are now looking at Volume 51, Number 1 of the Grand Lodge Bulletin. It was in December of 1935 that the first edition was published by direction of the Grand Lodge of Alberta. This was 30 years after the formation of Grand Lodge and for that period there was no official communication between the Grand Lodge and the Lodges. Even when the Bulletin was first issued, only three copies went to each Lodge so that our present broad distribution to the Brethren must be a great advance to our more senior members of the Craft.

Copies of the Bulletin are on file in the Grand Lodge Library and prove to be most interesting reading. Printed below is the first page of the first issue and its contents are as relevant today as they were then. The concerns, the hopes and the aspirations of men, whether mason or profane, were much the same as ours in struggling to create a better world for mankind.

GREETINGS.

At the Thirtisth Annual Communication of Crand Lodge held in Calgary on June 12th 1935, the Grand Master recommended the publication of a Monthly Grand Lodge Bulletin in experimental form for distribution to the Lodges. The Committee on the Grand Master's Address concurred in the recommendation and it was ratified by Grand Lodge in ession.

M.W.Bro. A.M. Mitchell has been given the duty of preparing the first copies and this issue comes to your Lodge as an indication of the lines which are to be followed. Naturally with space decidedly limited all material must be in very briof form, but it is hoped that ideas on many Masonic topics collected from widely distant fields may interest the brethren and induce them to follow the subjects farther.

Three copies only of the Bulletin will be supplied each Lodge for the present but it is suggested that it will be time well spont were the Bulbtin read at the Regular meeting of your Lodge, thus giving every attending brother the benefit of a short summary of Masonic news and views elsewhere.

The Bulletin will be composed of itams from the Masonic press, opinions of notable Masons everywhere and where possible news of Masonic happenings of more than local interest. The necessity for and use of the Bulletin will be a subject for discussion at the Thirty-first Annual Communication of Grand Lodge in Edmonton on June 10, 1936, All officers should examine its contents and make-up to be ready with considered opinion at that time.

With this first issue the editor takes the opportunity to extend to all Lodges and Brethren everywhere the Compliments of the Season.

The future of Freemasonry depends largely upon the better selection of men. Not every man is adapted to understand or appreciate the Masonic fraternity. It is a very unusual institution and what a men gets out of it will depend very largely upon his mental process. It is doubtful if there will ever again be a great influx of men into the fraternity. The chances are that as soon as the fraternity again becomes stabilized it will select its material with the utmost care.

FROM THE PAST

"THE LODGE TODAY"

There has always been the necessity for an intimate, personal contact between the Master and each member of his Lodge; to properly employ his brethren; and to make vital in his Lodge the spirit of brotherhood. These have been the constant requirements of a successful Master in all time, and have demanded the gift of himself, to his Lodge, if it were to be a vital influence in the lives of his brethren and through them in his community.

But today, in addition, there is the necessity for cultured spiritual leadership to combat the growing materialism of our age, and direct the methods employed, (and in many instances even to initiate them) to insure a Masonically educated Lodge membership.

And so today, a Warden may well pause and consider, before he accepts the election to the Master's chair. Having accepted it, he may employ two methods of filling his office. He may work alone. He may spend his every spare hour trying to overtake the possibilities of his office, in contacting his brethren; in planning his programmes; in preparing and arranging his messages of inspiration and education. If he has an attractive personality he may, by these means, cement his Lodge to himself, and be the mainspring of it. And he will have made a splendid contribution. Or, he may choose the more difficult, if less spectacular method, of cementing his brethren to each other, of discovering group leaders; of making all conscious of a spirit of unity that will permeate the every day life of every member of his Lodge. He may so evoke the willing co-operation of his officers that a co-ordinated programme of education will become a delight to all, instead of a burden to one or two, and so he will demonstrate the almost forgotten truth that it is a Lodge's supreme work to make MASONS instead of Lodge members.

The festivities begin on Friday, September 13th with Registration and Cocktails at 7:00 p.m.



HISTORICAL INTEREST

W. Bro. Ken Greenwood of Vermilion Lodge No. 24 sends in an interesting historical fact.

While visiting Fort Prince of Wales, a National Historic Park near Churchill, Manitoba he photographed the symbol seen in the picture.



The Fort was commenced in 1732 and took 40 years to build. Speculation has it that the square and compass was carved by one of the 24 men sent from England in 1731 to start construction. The symbol which is surrounded by radiating cuts approximately one half inch deep in the solid stone, is to be found on the inside face of the main balustrade by the main gate.
