Charles Edward Pinnell was born in Gloucestershire, England, on August 13, 1904, where he re-ceived his education. After serving two years in the Royal Air Force, Bro. Pinnell purchased his discharge in 1924 to emigrate to Canada to join his brother in Edmonton. Employed by the C.N.R., he was transferred to Calgary in April, 1928. In June, 1949, he resigned to accept a position with the House of Seagram as Alberta District Manager for Calvert Distillers Ltd. He then became Sales Manager, Prairie Provinces, for The Harrison Hotel,

Harrison Hot Springs, B.C., a branch of The House of Seagram.

He was a member of St. Michael and All Angels Anglican Church, Calgary, and in former years served as a Vestryman at this church and also at The Cathedral Church of the Redeemer. For many years he was active in The Associated Canadian Travellers and resigned as Executive President of the then Vice Dominion Council when he was elected Junior Grand Warden, in order that he would be free to devote more time to his Grand Lodge duties.

M.W.Bro. Pinnell was initiated in Crescent Lodge No. 87 Calgary in January 1943 and served as Worshipful Master in 1951. In May, 1969, he was honoured by being elected a Life Member. In 1959 he was appointed Grand Director of Ceremonies. In 1965 he was elected Junior Grand Warden and assumed the office of Grand Master in 1968.

He was active in other branches of the Fraternity and was a Past Thrice Puissant Grand Master of Calgary Lodge of Perfection, A. & A.S.R.; Past Commander in Chief, Southalta Consistory; a member of the Alberta Consistory; an Honorary Inspector General 33° of the Supreme Council for Canada. He was honoured by being elected to Honorary Life Member of Lethbridge Valley of Perfection in 1968 and made an Honorary 33° Mason, Southern Jurisdiction of Bellingham Valley, Washington. He was also a member of the following bodies: Otuskwan Chapter No. 9, R.A.M.; Zadok Council, Cryptic Rite; Taylor Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine and the Royal Order of Scotland. He was also a Past Captain of the Uniformed Bodies of Al Azhar Shrine Temple.

An ardent sportsman, both administratively and actively, he was a Past President of the Canadian Soccer Football Association, a Life Member of the Alberta Soccer Football Association and an Associate Director of the Calgary Stampeder Football Club. Golf, curling, bowling and hunting were relaxing pastimes for many years. In 1969, M.W.Bro. Pinnell retired from active employment and moved to White Rock, B.C. to enjoy what he had always sought, "an ocean view and a beautiful garden".

He is survived by his wife Hilda, son Brian and his daughter-in-law Marilyn; three grandchildren, David, Lori and Dona and one Great Grandchild, Seana.

Funeral services were held on October 22nd 1988 in Christ Episcopal Church in Blaine, Washington.

M.W.Bro. Pinnell was an active, involved person who gave much to his family, his community and his Craft. He gained back the love and respect of all he met. He will be remembered by all who were fortunate enough to know him.

ANSWER TO NOVEMBER QUESTION OF THE MONTH

In the Apron Lecture there is a reference to "the Purple of the Fraternity". It is noticeable, in Alberta Craft Masonry, that there is no purple to be seen.

Since antiquity, purple has been associated with exalted office. This arose from the use of Tyrian Purple, derived from the Mediterranean shellfish <u>Purpura murex</u>. This shellfish, caught by fisherman from Tyre yielded extremely small amounts of dye and the dyed cloth was correspondingly high in cost. Only the rich could afford purple cloth and slowly the supreme ruler became associated with the colour.

The expression "the purple" still conveys the idea of high rank and authority. Mackey states that at one time the collars and aprons of British Grand Lodge and Provincial Grand Lodge Officers were purple. While this is no longer the case, it is from those early years that the description entered our ritual, but today it simply means "the highest Masonic honours".

FROM AFAR

A NEW LODGE U.D.

On Monday September 19th, 1988 another historic event took place when Loyalty Lodge U.D. was instituted at King George Temple, Calgary. A banquet commenced the evening with guest speaker, V.W. Bro. Jim Roberts addressing the gathering on the timely topic, "Something old, something new, something borrowed, something blue".

The Most Worshipful The Grand Master, David A. Bruce, assisted by 18 Senior Grand Lodge Officers then instituted Loyalty Lodge, U.D. in due form, practising the Ancient York Rite Ritual. The impressive ceremony installed the first officers of the newly instituted lodge. The first W.M. is R.W.Bro. Ray Burton with R.W.Bro. Clarence Kraft as S.W. and W.Bro. Dave Blencoe as J.W. The Worshipful Master in his address to the new lodge stated that the objective of Loyalty Lodge, U.D. is 'education'.

There were 30 charter members in attendance representing 11 lodges from 3 districts. Visitors numbered 55, representing 32 lodges from 13 districts which included British Columbia, Saskatchewan and Holland.

The brethren of Alberta join in wishing success to this new lodge.

PROJECT ASHLAR FORT MCMURRAY LODGE NO. 195

As a result of the Banff Spring Workshop this year, an exciting Lodge project has blossomed.

While heading home, one of the brethren gazed in wonder at the one mountain of granite amongst the rest which are limestone and said; "I wonder if it would be possible to obtain some of the granite to have new ashlars made for the lodge? Another replied "why not get granite from the new quarry which is opening up at Fort Chipewyan on the shores of Lake Athabasca". Great discussion and planning took place all the way back to Fort McMurray.

More research was undertaken and a project leader was nominated in the person of Brother Tony Grace who had already visited the quarry earlier in March.

The granite in this quarry is burgundy in colour and named Wild Rose Granite and is similar in structure to the deposits on the Isle of Arran in Firth of the Clyde where curling rocks have been made for over a hundred years. When squared and polished the Fort Chipewayan granite is a most beautiful ashlar.

During the first quarter of 1989 the Worshipful Master, accompanied by his Wardens and brethren will go to the quarry on the Winter road to Fort Chipewayan, and stay at the Fort Chipewayan Lodge. They will then convene a Freemasons' lodge meeting at the quarry. The speculative Masons will then take up the working tools of the operative stonemason and cut the ashlar stones from the guarry and transport them to the workshop for perfecting and squaring. When the ashlars are squared and perfected to the satisfaction of the Worshipful Master; the first Worshipful Master of Fort McMurray Lodge, Worshipful Brother Lorne Youngberg assisted by the Past Masters of the lodge will oversee the final square checking at a properly convened lodge meeting later in 1989.

In addition to quarrying the full sized ashlars, a couple of hundred three quarter inch mini ashlars of granite will be obtained. These will be for presentation to each Master Mason and all future newly made Master Masons of the lodge to remind them of the effort required to bring rude matter to due form.

COMMITTEE NEWS

At some of the Master Masons' Meetings held in the province during 1988, presentations were made by committee chairmen. Each chairman had three minute to give information on his committee's operation and purpose. The chairmen were asked for copies of their presentations to share with the brethren. That of the Bulletin Committee chairman was obviously close at hand and is published below.

THE GRAND LODGE BULLETIN

First, let me tell you what the Constitution says about the Bulletin, its Editor and the membership of the committee - Yes brethren that is correct absolutely nothing.

The Grand Lodge Bulletin started with a concept of M.W.Bro. Mitchell who was Grand Master in 1929. He suggested the publication of a quarterly bulletin with information on the activities of Grand Lodge and other matters of interest. He recommended the sending of bulletins to secretaries for distribution with the notices. He said that this would help leadership and give inspiration - both needed in the lodges.

Nothing happened for 6 years. In 1935, the Grand Master, M.W.Bro. V.A. Bowes recommended experimental implementation of the previous suggestion from September 1935 to June 1936. He added some more details. He suggested 2 or 3 pages, an editorial committee, and subscription to Masonic periodicals for source material. He also recommended that it not contain local news but rather information of a general nature and that it contain any messages of the Grand Master. He stressed it have heavy emphasis on reprinted items from other Masonic periodicals. The primary intention was for it to be educational.

The Grand Lodge Bulletin was first produced in December 1935 and it was obviously a success. In 1936, M.W.Bro. M. Downey recommended its continuation. That was a powerful recommendation for here we are some 53 years later still publishing in much the same way.

Today its principal purpose is as a means of communication but there is no specific mandate as to what must or must not be published. The contents are determined generally by those first recommendations of 1935.

It is quite clear that the Bulletin reflects the different Editors. The Grand Master can of course give direction for his particular year but most have simply supported their Editors, submitted items they wished published and gave constructive comments.

The Editor has fairly free rein. He determines the general overall pattern for the content and then selects suitable items from any available source. He also writes some material to stimulate discussion, to enthuse members on good ideas, or comments on issues that he hears about. Recognition of events and people within the Jurisdiction has been, and remains, a high priority with most Editors. Articles sent in by the members are published when possible. Where editing is necessary, care is taken to keep the intent unchanged.

For the last three years there has been a Committee of three or four brethren who assist in developing the Bulletin. Each member has a specific task but all have a responsibility to make recommendations on every aspect of each issue. Recently the committee added another brother who has the sole responsibility to proofread each edition before the final draft goes to the printer.

The assembled material is typed into the Grand Lodge word processor and fitted into page format for the Editor's approval. It goes for its final proofread and then off to the printers as "camera-ready" copy.

The Editor and the Committee members are constantly seeking feedback on whether or not the Bulletin, in its present format, and with its present content, meets the needs of Alberta Masons. You can, and should, help to give this information because it is <u>your</u> Bulletin as well as Grand Lodge's. Your comments should be made, in writing, to the Editor. These comments can be compliments, recommendation, or even the statement, "keep on doing what you are doing." Any of these would give valuable information to the committee.

The parchment, which bears a message of congratulations from the Grand Lodge of Alberta to the Grand Lodge of Scotland, is backed by a buffalo hide. It was presented in 1936 on the occasion of the 200th Anniversary of the formation of the Grand Lodge, and is signed by Bro. V.H. Macaulay, Grand Master, and Bro. J.H.W. Kemmis, Grand Secretary."

Thanks go to Bro. Currie for his letter and information. Brethren visiting Scotland should visit this museum and see this link between our two jurisdictions.

RESEARCH PAPERS AT COMMERCIAL LODGE
