# LET'S TALK CHARITY

This year's theme is one which should always be on our minds as Masons. Indeed, it can be viewed as the very foundation of the fraternity. What is Masonic Charity?

How does it relater to present day attitudes? How effective is Masonic Charity within this Province?

Why do we endeavour to practice Masonic Charity? Is Masonic Charity merely our way of presenting a good image?

These points and many more will be considered in the Theme Addresses and will, no doubt, stir much discussion in the Discussion Groups which follow.

# THEME SPEAKER

Ralph Johnstone, our Theme Speaker in 1989, was born in 1928 in Blantyre, Nyasaland. (now Malawi) He received his formal schooling in Glasgow, Scotland.

In 1946 he joined the RAF and spent the next eight years as a pilot with the RAF. His career included flying jets in 1949 and being a member of the RAF Aerobatic Team in 1950.

In 1954 he left the United Kingdom and settled in Canada (Toronto) where he joined the RCAF in 1955. He spent four instructional tours of duty with the RCAF, including the flying of helicopters.

He retired from the RCAF in 1973 and settled in Edmonton where he was a life insurance salesman for 5 years and then became an Estate Administrator with the Public Trustee's office.

He is married to Irene and has three sons.

Masonically, he was raised in Argus Lodge at Kingston, Nova Scotia and affiliated with Strathcona Lodge, Edmonton in 1972. He was W.M. in 1981 and DDGM of District No. 19 in 1984-85. Currently, he is a member of the Grand Lodge Research and Education Committee. He is also active in concordant bodies.

There is no doubt that with his extensive life experience and his experience and knowledge of lasonry, our Theme Speaker this year will deliver powerful speeches designed to make us think.

#### SCHOOLS OF INSTRUCTION

#### The Master and His Wardens

This School directs its attention to the three principal officers' roles in the lodge and on the teamwork necessary to operate a lodge on a continual basis.

It will cover the planning process, basic communication skills, methods of ensuring involvement within a lodge, and much more....

# Appointed Officers

The Appointed Officers of any lodge are the future of the lodge. It can never be too early to allow them the opportunity of honing the skills which they will need as senior officers of their lodge.

By the same token, the importance of their present offices can never be under~estimated. This school will address both areas.

# Teaching Masonry to Masons

We are always encouraged to be open in our explanations to non-Masons of what the Fraternity is and what it stands for. This, however, raises concerns with some Brethren as to what can be discussed and what should not be discussed.

It also brings to light the fact that most brethren are not well versed in the various aspects of Freemasonry.

This school does not address the lack of knowledge directly, although much knowledge should be gained; it is designed to teach the participants how to have their brethren become more knowledgeable in the Craft. It will cover the resources available and how to use them, how to interpret the symbols of Freemasonry and a direction for research into Freemasonry, etc., etc. Masonic Forum - Where Should Masonry be going?

# QUESTION OF THE MONTH

Would there be any value in Grand Lodge stocking Masonic greeting cards for special occasions? If they were stocked would you use them?

#### ANSWER TO THE QUESTION FOR DECEMBER

The question asked why it is inappropriate to wear the golf club symbol.

While Masonry has become even more open in recent years, there are certain things which remain the secret of a Mason and in fact he promises not to reveal them. The primary secrets are those of recognition. To show a symbol of this nature, even though arguing that it is only recognized by Masons is what can be considered inappropriate at least.

Is there still a need for benevolence in Canadian society?

#### THE GRAND MASTER'S QUESTIONNAIRE

In April of 1988, M.W.Bro. Bruce had a questionnaire placed in the Bulletin. There were 146 replies from a possible 12,000 Alberta Masons.

An analysis has now been done and the Bulletin will publish the results over the next 3 issues.

Question One was: "What practical ways can we use to create a more positive image of the Craft?"

The common theme in almost all answers "We must do something". The breakdown of what to do was: advertise 25% charity and community work 27% improve image of Craft externally 46% improve image of Craft internally 31% do nothing 3%

Many respondents suggested more than one form of action. The suggestions related to internal image covered: the importance of self image; the importance of developing closer relationships between candidates, sponsors and investigators; and the stressing of careful selection of candidates. There is awareness of the time given to concordant bodies and the time lost in lodge through having to work in the third degree. The outside of lodge halls should be 'spruced up' and communication within lodges needs to be improved with quicker follow up of non-attenders.

Our external image suggested to some that we need professional guidance to help brethren and lodges to take a constructive and positive approach in discussing Masonry. Possibly a news editor or P.R. person to explain "image projection". Educational programs on "How to get involved in charity and volunteer work" were suggested.

Other suggestions included preparation of our own video tape, projecting a positive image without appearing superior, and making ourselves more visible in the community.

Some comments on charity within this question were to select a Grand Charity and focus on it, while others thought that the charitable acts should be left to the individual. It was suggested that <u>each lodge</u> should support some charity with time and labour and not just donations.

It was suggested that publicity on MHEBF recipients to local lodges could be a stimulus. Some felt that the MHEBF was for brilliant students and were unaware it is based on need.

The type of advertising suggested was for G.L. to release a statement on ideals and for lodges to advertise meetings, social events, and church parades. In addition, public tours of lodge rooms, especially at Heritage sites; town site notices of lodges and the display of M.M. certificates in work places.

The answers were very positive and constructive and should stimulate further discussion.

# EXCERPT FROM SOCIETY AND THE MASON'S MORAL LEADERSHIP by V.W.Bro. J. Roberts

I am sure that there were time when I used inappropriate language only to regret it later. I guess there are also times and places where it might be considered OK by the group in which we find ourselves. But there are times when it is not only not necessary, it is entirely inappropriate. Festive boards are meant to be a time of good fellowship, laughter and story telling. But the honour of the Craft suffers when some stories are told. And I can tell you in all candour that I inwardly cringe when I hear some of the stories that are told, not because of my calling as a Minister, but because I am a Mason who really believes that we cannot leave behind in the Lodge Room those things that we claim to be a part of our daily living. I don't accept the dictum of many in our society that "boys will be boys" and that is sufficient excuse for off-colour humour. I accept only "Masons must be Masons".


# REGIONAL MEETING
