Where Does Your Masonic Dollar Go?


There are constant comments on the "huge" amount of money that Grand Lodge takes in fees and assessments.

Where does this money really go and is it really such a large amount when viewed in relation to other costs? In order to see this more clearly let us start by looking at a lodge which charges a modest \$100.00 per vear as dues. It is realised that this amount is low for some Lodges and high for a few, but it gives us a Lodge Fees - 68.2% starting point. If we look

at the total annual amount charged to a Lodge, we see that

What other costs are charged against each Lodge Member?

Most Districts have a per capita fee to offset some of the expenses of the district — in particular the operation of the District meeting and the PDDGM

Jewel. The average is about \$1.50 but this does not pass through Grand Lodge.

In 1988, at the Grand Communication, discussion took place on the fact that Grand Lodge had been operating for many years on a day-to-day system. There was no buffer against slow cash flow. In fact Grand Lodge was regularly forced to borrow money at different times

of the year to keep operating. The Budget was accurate but the money did not come in at evenly spaced intervals. The

voting members present at that Communication, on behalf of all Lodges, voted to assess each

member \$5.00 per year for 10 years (or until \$500,000 was reached) to build up a financial buffer. SP92 Benevolence-5% The assessment. known as SP88 is not

used for operation except by loan which must be repaid.


In 1992 the problem of a rapidly depleting Benevolence Fund was brought before the members at the Grand Communication. Again, on behalf of all Masons, the voting members agreed to another \$5.00 assessment to enable the charitable function of this fund to continue. This assessment is for a five year period.

A number of copies of the Grand Lodge Bulletin, equal to the membership, is sent to each lodge ten times each year for mailing with the Lodge summons. The cost is 18 cents per copy and the charge is the actual cost of production divided by the number of copies to make it self supporting.

Using a fairly low pay rate of \$10.00 per hour the cost of the Grand Lodge per capita fee takes approximately Per Capita Fee two hours of work per year!

Chart 3 shows how the per capita fees are used. \$0.75 is the cost of holding the Grand Lodge Communication. This covers the cost of meeting rooms, printing of the

ballot forms and for guest VIP meals and rooms.

Printing takes \$1.35 of the fee for the large amount of material that must be produced each year. The Proceedings, Bursary Committee printing, GL Officers printing, Committee printing, Preliminary Reports, Proceedings of the Banff/All Canada Conferences and all forms and publications issued by Grand Lodge.

Approved conference and visitation expenses for GL officers and their ladies uses \$1.70 of the total. The schedule of visits is monitored and appears in the GL budget.

\$2.25 of the total per capita fee goes to Grand Lodge Officers' expenses, including travel expenses, regalia and regalia repair, G.Sec's expenses and automobile allowance, northern Lodge travel expenses, and the pre-approved allowances for certain GL officers.

GST, Furniture and fixtures and depreciation take up \$0.60 of the total while another \$0.60 is used for approved Committee expenses.

The final \$11.35 is for salaries and general administration. The salaries portion includes staff benefits, temporary staff to cover absences and overload periods, CPP, UIC and Workers Compensation. The administration portion covers the Auditor's fee, bank charges, computer operation, administration of Benevolent and Bursary funds, insurance, office printing, office maintenance, office security, rent, supplies, postage, staff development, telephone and sundry expenses.

The budget is discussed at each Grand Lodge Communication after it has been developed by the Budget Committee, reviewed by the Finance Committee and then reviewed and approved by the Board of General Purposes, which has each DDGM as a member in addition to elected and appointed members.

Your Per Capita fee is only \$18.50 and seems to buy many services under a carefully scrutinized annual budget. The Grand Lodge is essential for operation of the Lodges in a Jurisdiction - please do not condemn it for expending moneys that the voting members have approved. If you have concerns, discuss them with your Lodge Officers, your Past Masters (who are all voting members) and your DDGM. These are the people who can voice your concerns on the floor at a Grand Communication.

Record Breaking Masonic Family

Four Generations of Reach Family Members of Alberta Lodge No. 3

It began in the latter years of the nineteenth century, when Alberta Lodge had its genesis as Alberta Lodge No. 37, G.R.Manitoba. Fort Macleod was in the then Northwest Territories — hence, under the jurisdiction of G.R.M., Bro. C.J. Reach (generation one) was a member of this lodge.

When Alberta became a province in 1905, C.J. became a charter member of Alberta Lodge No.3 GRA.

Generation two was C.J.'s son, RW Bro. Charles S. Reach, Worshipful Master, 1947 and DDGM 1951/52.

Generation three is RW Bro. Robert E. Reach, Worshipful Master in 1963, PDDGM

Generation four: WM Brian Reach was installed as Worshipful Master December 27 1993.

Four generations of Reach's, with three Worshipful Master and two DDGMs, is an enviable Masonic tradition.

Grand Lodge Library

The Grand Lodge Library has had a facelift.

Since last September, a group of Brethren have worked hard at archiving some materials and re-cataloguing the book collection of the Library. In place of the previous 40+ classification system, there is now one of thirteen different areas. All of it has been computerized and the Grand Lodge now has an on-line system for searching Titles, Authors and Subjects.

This system will be available, on a 3.5 inch diskette, for all Brethren at the Masonic Spring Workshop and from the Grand Lodge office after that. It will normally be supplied on a 3.5 inch diskette, except by special request. At the time of going to press, the price has not been set — it will be modest and all profits will go back into the Library.

Future plans include the indexing of all papers and articles in the Library, as well as adding other collections within the Province to the Grand Lodge system. This will let Masonic Researchers check one index but locate books throughout the Province.

Also, in the last few months, numerous new books have been added, bringing the number of books close to the 900 mark. However, donations are always welcome. All donated books will have a sticker placed in them naming the donor.

Lodges which do not have, and do not intend to have, their own libraries can help Brethren throughout the Province by forwarding any books they may have in their possession to the Grand Lodge for the Library.

Each Brother within the Province can assist in the growth of the Library by ensuring that his family knows what to do with his books and regalia and also by checking with widows of departed Brethren for Masonic books. What better way for their husbands to be remembered!

What Masons Do! 125th Anniversary Medal Recipient



We wish to tell you about one of the greatest Masons we have ever known — he appears in the picture above. No, in this case it is not our Grand Master MW Bro. Myron Lusk — rather, we are talking about the Mason on his right, W Bro. Art Boggs of Vermilion Lodge. This picture says a lot about our Brother Art Boggs. Art can usually be found helping quietly behind the scene, standing a little back from the limelight, pleased to have the Grand Master present a \$1,000.00 cheque from the Higher Education Bursary Fund to Evelyn Gwen Thomas of Vermilion.

Like so many really great Masons when there is work to he done, Art is always there. For more than fifty years, in his quiet unassuming manner, Art has dedicated his life to helping others.

Art designed and developed the Educational wing for the United Church, he then renovated the kitchen, rebuilt the hall and Sunday School room and, finally, finished by rebuilding the foyer and walkway.

In 1981-83 he organized homes, jobs and schooling for 27 Vietnamese immigrants.

He acted as a Consultant for CESO (Canadian Executive Service Organization) for three different Canadian Native bands to develop self supporting businesses. Last year, he was in Sumatra as an advisor to a parquet floor and furniture plant. This last activity was a joint CESO/Rotary project. With Rotary, he went to Portugal twice to restore a 500 year old stone house as an educational learning centre.

On his own, Art initiated the fund raising for a local nursing home and, when enough money was available, coordinated and supervised its building and landscaping. He even spent some of his Saturdays putting paint where it was required. Now that the home is functional, Art is a constant visitor, where his warm smile brings comfort and friendship to the sick and elderly.

Most Sundays, you will find Art singing in the church choir or accompanying on the piano. At special community events it is not uncommon to find Art leading the group in a sing-a-long.

Art puts many hours of love into the care of his beautiful garden. On Sundays his fresh flowers are often found adorning the church altar.

It is no small wonder that Art was a recipient of Cana-

da's 125th Anniversary Medal. This is a tribute for his extraordinary contribution to his community and his country.

On the first Tuesday of the month, the Brethren invite you to visit Vermilion Lodge. When you arrive, you will note that the lodge room has been carefully prepared. Notice the floors are swept and washed. Perhaps the grass was cut, or snow was shovelled from the walks just prior to your arrival. You can also rest assured that, at the festive board, hot coffee with fresh cream and sandwiches will be served.

As you enter the Lodge, look for Art, the soft spoken Mason pictured above. Chances are it was Art who, once again, freely gave of his time to prepare the Lodge and the festive board for your pleasure.

A New Voice

Kyle Lillo got his voice back recently, due to generosity of **The Edmonton Sun** readers and the **Masonic Foundation**. The Masonic Foundation donated more than \$3000 of the required \$7000 to purchase a speech synthesizer for use by Kyle.

"I thank everyone for helping me" were the first words he "spoke", after typing in the words on the unit's keyboard.

There was a brief ceremony of presentation at Dovercourt Elementary School and the Grand Master was there. He said, "God Bless the **Edmonton Sun**," and "I want to commend the **Sun** for really taking hold of this story and bringing it to public attention."

Kyle had been using a borrowed unit from the Glenrose Rehabilitation Hospital but it had to be returned. This had caused considerable sorrow for Kyle and his parents, as it was the first time he had been able to communicate easily since an accident which had left him brain damaged. Because he was unable to speak he had attempted to use sign language but, due to poor motor skills, he was unable use this technique without difficulty.

The "DynaVox" speech synthesizer is a lap-top unit, with different programs for letters, symbols, recreation and food. Kyle chooses the sequence of symbols he wants and the machine speaks for him.

The unit is owned by the Alberta Education's GRIT Program for disabled youngsters but it is Kyle's for as long as he requires it. Kyle is fully integrated into a Grade 2 program in Leduc and will now be able to communicate with his friends.

The parents shed tears over the generosity of so many people and we, as Masons, were proud of our ability to contribute towards the enrichment of a young person's life.

Masonicalia Society News:



The Masonicalia Society of Alberta comprises a group of Masons who are dedicated to the gathering, study and preservation of everything relating to Masonic material culture.

On Saturday, October 30, 1993, the Chinook Shopping Mall in Calgary was the scene of a Mini-show. Held in conjunction with the Calgary Military Historical Society, Masonicalia Society President W Bro. Tom Hargreaves featured a display of Masonic jewels, Masonic philatelic covers and books, which illustrated the connection of Freemasonry with the military.

After the formation of the first Grand Lodge in 1717, military lodges carried the philosophy of our fraternity to the four corners of the earth. The first military lodge, which was a 'stationary' lodge, was formed at Gibraltar in 1728. Later, warrants created 'travelling lodges', the first such warrant being issued to the First Foot Regiment, which later became the Royal Scots. Frequently, several Lodges existed in the same regiment. Freemasonry was introduced into Canada in Nova Scotia, by Ensign Erasmus Philipps, a British officer in the 40th Regiment in 1750, when he petitioned the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts to form a Lodge at Halifax.

During the Mini-show, W Bro. Hargreaves and MS0A member Bro. Greg Nehring fielded some interesting questions, such as why one of the jewels contained a 'swastika'. The swastika, of course, can be found in the catacombs of Rome and was used by many different peoples over the centuries long before its degradation during the Second World War.

On concluding the Mini-show, Tom Hargreaves was convinced that the interaction with the general public had been a day well spent in support of the Masonic Renewal effort and 'Vision 2000' — our Grand Master's theme.
