Installation Month



Alberta Masons Reach Out To The Young

Freemasonry's New Venture

WE CAN HELP is the replacement program for the very successful LIFESAVER CHALLENGE that was delivered to over 20,000 elementary grade school children last year in Alberta. 1994 is the fifth and final year of LIFESAVER CHALLENGE.

LIFE SAVER CHALLENGE was discontinued because the demand was much greater than the supply of St. John Ambulance volunteer instructors. The WE CAN HELP program utilizes the regular teaching staff and this way is likely to get more students through the program.

With the Masons' help, the children of Alberta will soon be able to say WE CAN HELP!

St. John Ambulance's program "We Can Help" is a first aid safety awareness program geared towards children aged 7-10. For the next two years, St. John Ambulance will offer this program to all Grade III students in Alberta free of charge. The program, which deals with the basics of first aid and safety is a perfect introduction for children of this age. Children today are often given a great deal of responsibility. We would like to help ensure that their knowledge of first aid and safety is as strong as possible. The program consists of:

- 1. Children's Activity Booklet
- 2. Instructor's Resource Booklet
- 3. First Aid and Safety Poster Kit
- 1. Participation Certificate

As part of this initiative, St. John Ambulance will be offering seminars to all Grade III teachers in the province. At these sessions, instructors will go over the program in detail and answer any questions that the teachers may have. Following the sessions, the teachers will be invited to request materials for their classes. The initial pilot program has been successful in Calgary and the full program will be introduced to all Alberta schools in the fall of 1994.

St. John Ambulance had sought sponsors for this program and estimated that the material costs for the two year period would be \$24,000. They are looking to train approximately 45,000 grade three students per year.

- The sponsors' names and logos will be placed onto the participation certificate.
- The names and logos will be included in documentation provided to teachers.
- Print advertising will be placed to identify program sponsorship.

Beyond these options, sponsors' names will be mentioned in conjunction with the program to all media, school boards and schools. It goes without saying that any program that focuses on injury prevention — especially at this age — gets a great deal of media and community attention.

At the October Board of General Purposes Meeting, a very well-presented case for involvement in a specific activity was brought to the Board by MW Bro. Stan Mottershead. After consideration of the presented material, outlined below, it was approved that Grand Lodge would co-sponsor this activity for its three year period, in conjunction with the Shrine and other concordant bodies.

Fort McMurray Masons Show Themselves



On September 3rd, members of Fort McMurray Lodge appeared in full regalia on the Ashlar Building Club float in the Fort McMurray Blueberry Festival Parade. The Fort McMurray Brethren joined forces with the Al Shamal Shrine Club, Eastern Star Chapter 137 and The Fort McMurray Ashlar Club. The Ashlar Building Club consists of members of all three groups, who are raising money to construct a community building, which will also have a Lodge and Chapter room.

The parade was seen by an estimated five thousand people and was shown on the local cable TV channel.

This was the first time that Masons have appeared in regalia in Fort McMurray and the intention was to promote the aims of the Ashlar Building Society and to raise the profile of Masonry in Fort McMurray.

Correction

In the October *Bulletin* there was an article relating to donations to the Masonic Higher Education Bursary Fund. In this article reference was made to a fifty dollar donation only costing the donor \$12.00. This was an error and should have said that there would be a saving of \$12.00 so that a fifty dollar donation would really cost \$38.00.

The Editor thanks the many accountants, mathematicians and income tax experts for identifying the error so promptly.

According to one set of calculations, the net cost of a \$50 donation would be \$37.20 if total annual charitable donations were less than \$250.00 and only 28.17 if a brother donated more than \$250.00 annually.

It is the hope of the Higher Education Bursary Committee that many members will endeavour to take advantage of one of these tax savings through their generosity to a most worthy Masonic charity.

Centennial Celebration

Perfection Lodge No. 60 under the Grand Lodge of Manitoba received its Dispensation on June 26, 1894, and was Constituted August 7, 1895. It was later renumbered Perfection Lodge No. 9 under the Grand Lodge of Alberta on October 12, 1905.

Its centennial installation will take place at the Calgary Masonic Hall on Tuesday, January 3, 1995, tyling at 7:30 PM, with the Grand Master attending on his fraternal visit. This meeting will be preceded by a banquet at 5:30 PM after cocktails at 5:00 PM.

The centennial year will culminate with an emergent Centennial meeting on Saturday, August 5, 1995 (the long weekend), tyling at 1:00 PM followed by a gala celebration at the Palliser Hotel with banquet and dance.

From The Mail

Referring to the "Letter to the Editor" in the October 1994 Bulletin, I think a reply is necessary.

RW Bro. Elford seems to be under the impression that the same committee members have been elected year after year, thus preventing other brothers from serving. However, if he checks back in the Annual Proceedings, he will find that names change in all Boards and Committees. Also the Constitution and Regulations point out that a brother can only serve a maximum of three terms on the Board of General Purposes.

Limiting an elected person to only a two year term would not be satisfactory. The first year on a committee is spent learning and studying what your predecessors have done before. The second year enables you to contribute more knowledge to the matters that come up. Also you need a continuity among the members and two years is not enough.

The remarks made by a couple of brothers, when asked to run for election, i.e. "What's the use, the same people get elected every year", in my opinion, is a "cop-out".

There are two very important Grand Lodge Committees that point out what Masonry, where practised, is all about. They are the Masonic Higher Education Bursary Fund Committee and the Board of Benevolence. If the younger and newer members, who are qualified, would serve on these committees, they would find that it would enhance their Masonic lives more than anything else within Grand Lodge.

As far as being elected to these two committees, they will find that there are many openings. The members are always elected and, when you check back, you will find that most members are elected by acclamation for the simple reason that the brothers do not seem to be interested in running for these offices. As a matter of fact, we don't seem to get enough nominations to fill the vacancies. I would suggest the brethren read my report to Grand Lodge as President of the Board of Benevolence, in the 1994 Proceedings, to see how uninterested the brethren are. For example, in 1993, three were to be elected to the Board only two nominations were submitted. In 1994, three were to be elected — only one nomination was submitted. If any brother is interested in committees he must show it and submit his nomination. We do not have to bother "resoling the old shoes" — we get new pairs every year.

I must point out to all brethren that these two committees are MASONRY IN ACTION!
