Goodwill Toward Men

Volume 4, Issue 2 of FOCUS, a communication of the Masonic Service Association of North America, brought us an article worth considering in its entirety. It is entitled THE ALTA VENDITA.

"Several Catholic newspapers, particularly in the Northeast and Midwest (United States), have been running a story with the headline the Alta Vendita with a sub-headline A Blueprint for the Subversion of the Catholic Church."

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"There follows a story about the "secret" plan of the Freemasons to infiltrate the Catholic Church, particularly by introducing such ideas as the "Principles of 1789" which include: pluralism, equality of religions, and separation of Church and State. The *Alta Vendita* plan was supposed to have been introduced around 1820.

"Supposedly the *Alta Vendita* was the highest lodge of the Carbonari (an Italian Secret Society), and their secret papers fell into the hands of Pope Gregory XVI who ordered their publication.

"Because the story had such wide circulation, we thought our readers should have some background as to its origin.

"The story itself is baseless and false. Freemasonry neither had nor has a plan or a desire to infiltrate or try to destroy the Catholic Church. As best as we can determine, this particular story is being retold by extremists within the Catholic Church to strengthen their own position. Much anti-Masonic material is distributed by extremists within several Protestant denominations.

"Freemasonry is making every attempt within its power to establish cordial relations with the Catholic Church, based on mutual respect and toleration. We shall continue this effort!"

So much for the article in Focus. Let us not dwell on the supposed connection between our Craft and the 19th century Carbonari (or charcoal burners of France and Italy) who died out about 1830. Any interested Brother can read up on them in most encyclopædias, including some Masonic ones. We still might want to know the meaning, in English, of *Alta Vendita*. The Carbonari called a lodge a vendita which, curiously enough means "sale", although "venditio" is the more proper term (hence our vendor). The adjective alta (the feminine gender of altus) means, high, deep or profound. Would we, in language familiar to us, translate Alta Vendita as "Grand Lodge"? This, however, we need not do because we are not responsible for the Carbonari of yore, nor do we have to defend ourselves. After all, these accusations can rightly be called, again in Latin, ex alto, and that, we are happy to note, means "far fetched"!

The closing paragraph of the quoted article above, ending in "We shall continue this effort" says it all — let us dispel any misconceptions about Freemasonry in friendly conversation, and what better time of the year is there to remind us of the dictum to exercise GOODWILL TOWARD MEN?

Book Review

Bloodline of the Holy Grail

This is yet another of those speculative books which claim to have sorted out the true story of the New Testament, the Holy Grail, the lineage of Jesus, and what happened to many Biblical personages. The book suffers from some of the usual shortcomings of this class. References to well-established works are few, in fact in many places where footnotes are needed they are lacking. For example, on page 59, "Jesus was a distinctly westernized Jew — Hellenist — as opposed to the rigidly staunch Hebrews such as John the Baptist." Some evidence or reference from the New Testament would have made the statement more meaningful. On page 63, "The Essenes were advocates of the Greek philosopher Pythagoras..." No reference to any of the published Dead Sea Scrolls or other writing is offered. Believe the authors on faith. On page 311 the authors state that Dante, author of the Divine Comedy, was a notable Rosicrucian Grand Master (no reference given). One of Dante's most avid students was Christopher Columbus. Dante's dates are 1265-1321; Columbus 1446-1506. How could Columbus study under Dante after Dante was dead? If the authors meant Columbus studied Dante's works why not say so? And which works of Dante prove the assertion of Dante being a Rosicrucian Grand Master? Of course, no references are given.

The author has Jesus survive the crucifixion, but has him die probably in India. Other authors of this genre have Jesus die in Rome after travelling around with Paul, or in the south of France. Jesus' wife, Mary Magdalene and his son do escape the Holy Land and live in the south of France. The description of the bizarre pattern for conjugal relations to occur between Jesus and his wife makes one wonder how speculative the author can become. James, the brother of Jesus, according to the author, used the name Joseph of Arimathea to travel around England. Obviously James does not die as described in

the New Testament any more than Jesus does.

The book rambles for 489 pages. It rewrites much history and decides that the Royal House of Stewart are descendants of the bloodline of Jesus and his brother James. This reviewer is still uncertain about how the Holy Grail fits into all of this. The Knights Templar are dredged up again in both the Holy Land and Scotland.

For those interested in arcane literature and like to speculate that much of history is hidden from us ordinary folks, this book is for them. This reviewer is tired of dogmatically written speculation and also wonders how the authors of this speculative history always seem to "discover" the true meaning of writings or events when recognized scholars seem to be too dense to see the true interpretation. The book is a long, and for this reviewer, tedious read. Again, those who like speculation might enjoy it.

1998 Masonic Spring Workshop Prepares For a New Direction

On a recent meeting notice, a cry from our Masonic wilderness drew my attention. The concern could not have been more adequately expressed by any Mason. It read: "Where are we going? How do we get there? Who is going to lead us? Who will lead us into the 21st century?"

These questions show a growing concern over the diminishing popularity of Freemasonry with its declining membership. Various factors have been cited for this obvious dilemma, amongst them are:

- the increasing demand on available time;
- a lack of a united focus;
- an inherent opposition to change;
- the increased incidence of anti-Masonic influences;
- the lack of a Mission and Strategic Plan;
- reactive rather than proactive remedies; and
- insufficient leadership development.

The Masonic Spring Workshop Committee, at a meeting held on November 28, 1996, unanimously agreed that the theme for the 1998 workshop will be 'FREEMASONRY'S DIRECTION — WEATHER VANE OR COMPASS' and that the workshop motif will include a weather vane and a directional compass. Such a theme will provide ample scope for the workshop sessions to set the stage for a reversal of the membership trend and a possible return to perpetual growth.

The Keynote Address for the 1998 Masonic Spring Workshop will be delivered by Dr. Gary H. Leazer, Ph.D., of Georgia. Described as a dedicated and conservative Christian Scholar, minister and author, Dr. Leazer is the Founder and Director of the Centre for Interfaith Studies. He is also the author of the book *Fundamentalism & Freemasonry, The Southern Baptist Investigation of the Fraternal Order.*

The story of Dr. Leazer's journey to the door of the temple is a remarkably poignant one. He was introduced to Freemasonry by an ironic twist of fate. In 1993, as a Director of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board, he was ordered to investigate the Masonic Fraternity. A scholar of uncompromising integrity and conviction, Dr. Leazer endured dismissal and alienation rather than distort the truth.

On 17 September 1996, he was initiated into Freemasonry, and raised on 8 February, 1997 in Clarkston Lodge No. 492, Georgia. Dr. Leazer's fourteen plus years with the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board, coupled with the valuable expe-

rience gained whilst investigating the Fraternity, have provided him with a unique and unbiased perspective of the Craft, the story of which he has agreed to share with us at the 1998 Masonic Spring Workshop.

In his book, "Fundamentalism & Freemasonry," Dr. Leazer devotes two chapters to the subject of responding to specific attacks on Freemasonry. The valuable content of these chapters enables the Mason to politely correct and intelligently enlighten the critic of Freemasonry. Dr. Leazer will likely expand on his keynote address when he facilitates a Saturday workshop session.

The Workshop Committee is now concentrating on the type and content of the Workshop sessions and we anticipate that they will be planned to serve as a prescription to remedy the Fraternity's malady; or at the very least attempt to suitably respond to the earnest plea in the opening paragraph of this message.
